Support When It's Needed Most



"Carolyn" was a hardworking single mom, doing customer service jobs to take care of her three children. Then hardship struck - she became very ill in 2022 due to kidney failure. They were renting a twobedroom apartment, which is what she could afford for the four of them, and until that time had been able to make ends meet. Now bills started to be an issue at a time when she needed to focus on her health. Their situation got to the point that her daughter dropped out of school so she could work to support the family.

They first came to OUR Center just to get groceries from our Community Market to help stretch their budget. But as housing became uncertain, they asked for rental assistance from one of the OUR Center's Resource Specialists.

Our team member realized that one-time assistance would not suffice for this family. She referred Carolyn to Ivy, our Housing Stabilization Program (HSP) Specialist. As part of the casework process, Ivy helped them with budgeting and looked at other resources we could help with by using the Colorado Family Support Assessment tool.

By enrolling them in HSP, Ivy could work with them longer-term and more in depth, providing financial assistance for rent and utilities but also referrals to other resources and advocacy. Ivy worked with this family for a year in the program. Even after they were technically no longer in HSP, she continued helping the family with things like the application for Social Security Disability Income (SSDI) and other government benefits, plus child-

An important aspect of her advocacy work was helping them apply for subsidized housing. They worked together on applying for other housing options that would be more affordable

or subsidized. She connected them with mediation services to help navigate their housing lease, so they would not be committed to an annual lease should they be approved for subsidized housing. Ivy helped them apply for utility rebate programs such as Longmont Cares. They have been able to get clothing for the children from our Community Closet. And finally, Ivy helped with language translation, as English is not their primary language.

The family was finally approved for a subsidized unit after months of waiting for any updates from all the applications submitted, and recently moved into their new home. The family is excited about this new step! Carolyn's daughter, who left school to help pay the bills, now wants to take the time to obtain her GED to further her education. Carolyn continues to focus on her health and wait for a kidney.

Carolyn says she is "very thankful for the extra time and care that Ivy has taken, even after they were not officially in her program. We cannot find the words to thank you!"

By the Numbers...

From January through September 2023, OUR Center:

- ♦ Served 43,207 meals
- Distributed
 653,860 pounds
 of groceries in
 12,943 visits
- Provided utility shut-off prevention to 616 households*
- Provided rent help to 574 households*
- Cared for 38 children at Aspen Center

*Our Homelessness Prevention Program provided \$705,600 in financial assistance in 9 months!

Did You Know? Our Community Closet gives out free housewares in addition to clothing! We are especially trying to fill our housewares section for families moving into new housing units, or who have had an emergency or crisis and have to start over with restocking their home.

In 2020, the staff at Aspen Center for Child Development, guided by director Elizabeth and her experience in Reggioinspired context, began studying and learning about this educational philosophy. The Reggio Approach was developed by parents, teachers and Loris Malaguzzi after WWII. Here's why it is one of our favorite principles. The Reggio Approach:

- 1. Was recognized as the best Early Childhood Education in the world in 1992 and gained recognition in North America.
- 2. Has become widely known and appreciated for its innovation and high regard for young children
- 3. Embraces social constructivism—humans learn by doing and in relation to others
- 4. Believes high quality education is a right

- 5. Believes social justice, equity, and inclusion is a responsibility of the school system
- 6. Focuses on a strong image of the child:
- Children are competent, capable and contribute meaningful ideas.
- Children have the right to study what is interesting to them.
- Children are insightful and offer unique perspectives about the world.
- Children have the right to beautiful environments and innovative materials.

In that spirit, I want to take a few moments to celebrate just a few of the many accomplishments at the OUR Center and Aspen Center for Child Development:

At the Aspen Center,

- we have assembled a fantastic team that is talented, passionate, and committed to providing the best early childhood experience for the children we serve. Elizabeth, our Preschool Director, can't help but beam with joy and pride when she talks about her 'dream team'. As the program continues to stabilize and recover from the pandemic, we look forward to reopening all of our classrooms in 2024.
- Through September, we have served more than 6,300 households in the Community Market and over 43,000 meals in our Community Cafe.
- We continue to work very hard to meet the elevated and increasingly more complex community needs.

- We are on pace to provide support to well over 1,000 households with over \$1,000,000 in rent and utility assistance.
- In July, we hosted a free community conversation for parents, "A Recipe for Resilience". This event was a kickoff to our Circle of Parents support groups. Our first group has been successfully launched and we are excited to explore new opportunities to support parents and help break the cycle of poverty.
- tiple gatherings to inform the community about our services and needs, including our bi-monthly "Coffee for a Cause", Chamber networking events, multiple tours and presentations, and in October, our first-ever "Participant Experience" in conjunction with a Donor Appreciation event.

Community is at the heart of everything we do at the OUR Center and Aspen Center. This concept centered us as we navigated the unknowns of the pandemic and the
